

Recycling Clothes



If you have old clothes that you don't need anymore, put them in a bag and take them to a clothes bin. Then people will take the bags to Charity shops, Textile Banks and Recycling centers. Many clothes get rejected and sent to other localised resales.

The average consumer throws away 81.5 lbs (36.96 kg) of clothes

every year.

Re-wear – any clothing that can be worn again can be sold as second hand.

Reuse – old clothes and textiles can be turned into other items, for a different use.

Recycle – any clothing or items that cannot be used can be turned into other things.

Join the Pledge to Make Our School Eco - Friendlier


We want to reduce the amount of plastic put to landfill. Soft plastic is recyclable, yet it cost money and therefore people throw it in landfills instead.

If every child and adult in Yorke Mead stops eating a packet of crisps or sweets once a week, we can save **502** wrappers a week - if everyone takes a part. In a whole year, we would save **26,104** wrappers, and **2, 151** packets per month. This can then help our school to reduce waste and energy used to recycle these packets and wrappers.

We want to waste less, in order to do so, we can reduce what we put in our bins and recycle more.

- animal farming


What can we do to help our planet?



Food-waste reducing recipes

Tried and tested by Yorke Mead families! Did you know that 0.9 million of bananas are wasted in the UK every year? And shocking 20 million slices of bread too.

Banana Cake recipe

Ingredients:

140g of butter, softened, plus extra for the tin.

140g of caster sugar.

2 large eggs, beaten.

140g of self-raising flour.

1 teaspoon of baking powder.

2 very ripe bananas, mashed.

Method:

Heat oven to 180°C/160°C fan/ gas 4.

Butter a 2lb cake or loaf tin and line with parchment paper.

Cream softened butter and caster sugar until light and fluffy. Slowly add 2 beaten eggs.

Fold in the flower, baking powder and the smashed bananas.

Pour the mixture into the prepared tin and bake for 50 minutes.

Bread and Butter Pudding Recipe

Ingredients:

60g butter

10 slices of stale bread

60g sultanas

½ lemon, zest only

350ml of whole milk

100ml double cream

3 eggs

60g golden caster sugar

1tsp vanila extract

Nutmeg

Method:

Preheat oven to to 180° C/ 160° C fan/ gas 4 and butter a baking dish (20cm x 25cm).

Butter the slices of bread and cut them into quarters. Arrange half of bread quarters, buttered side up in a dish, scatter sultanas and lemon zest, cover with the rest of the buttered bread.

Whisk eggs with 50g sugar, add milk, cream and vanilla extract.

Pour the mixture over bread, soaking it all, let it rest for 30 minutes and then bake for 35 - 40 minutes.


Serve with custard.

I would like you to start using Ecosia to help the environment. Ecosia is a search engine, like Google but better for the environment. Ecosia use their profits to plant trees. They use all the money they make for climate action, most of their money is spent on planting trees.

Ecosia uses solar panels to power the internet searches we make. They make enough solar energy to power the internet searches twice over. That means they don't use fossil fuels like coal or gas which will run out one day. All the fuel they use is renewable, which means we can make more of it. So that is better for the environment.

On Ecosia, you can see how many trees you have helped to plant. The more searches you make, the more trees you can help plant. So far Ecosia have planted over 100 million trees. They plant them in 35 countries across the world like France and India. On their website you can read more about the tree planting projects in the different countries.

So, start using Ecosia today and tell everyone you know to use it too. Then you help save the planet while doing your homework.
